HENRY demonstrated and talked about two of the projects he built. These were both taken from articles in R/C MODELER. His talk was informative and interesting. I'm just sorry I'm not technical enough to give you more details. The servo analyzer is built to test 4 servos under load. It is compact enough to take to the field and you can test your servos after each flight. It costs about \$25 plus building time. The Battery tester is also compact and minimizes radio failure by test your batteries accurately the field.

### MORE ACTIVITY



# MODELS MAKE THE NEWS

I received a letter from Jr. member RANDY HICKTON. I am printing what he wrote because I am sure you will be interested.

"January 16, 1975 at 4:30 PM, I was watching the Mike Douglas Show from Miami Beach. Mike had as a guest, Sheriff Mel Baily from Birmingham Alabama, with his R/C planes used in fighting crimg Sheriff Baily said his planes would be used, for example, in the case of a sniper. By using the planes they hope to cut down on the deaths of officers which totaled over 100 last year.

The pilot of the planes was 18 year old Wayne Chansee (spelling?). For the first flight demonstration he had a plane similar to a Super Kaos. The color I don't know because I had a black and white set, sorry. Sheriff BAily stated the top speed was about 75 MPH. It had a 1.5 HP motor. Taking off on sand was a problem, as Wayne came close to the crowd with the plane. But the take off was completed. Baily said the gusting wind was a problem. After the take off Wayne made a few passes, did a few barrel rolls, one or two loops and then lined up for a landing. Everything looked good, then bang, the sand caught the nose wheel and flipped the plane. Mo damage was reported, only a few broken elastics when the wing came off. The next plane looked like an Evolution When asked about cost, Sheriff Baily said between \$450 and \$500 . This madel weighed between twelve and fourteen pounds. This included a payload of approximately two punds. The payload was one grenade , smoke type, and a smoke flair. The radio was an MRC. Wayne hand started both planes, but flooded this one. While trying to start he said he could get from twelve to thirty minutes flying time. Wayne finally started the engine and had a better take off than the one before. Wayne circled the plane around a few times then released the smoke grenade which hit what looked like a 10' circle on the beach. When asked when this would



be ready, he replied '"it's ready now but has not been used yet'".

Next was a circling exercise which mulated circling a building releasing a smoke screen. This would most likely be used forcover when officers were entering a building. While flying the circle the station went into a commercial and when Mike returned the plane was down and a new act had started. The demonstration lasted about fifteen minutes. "Randy.

Thanks for the info. Randy. I missed this as I was working at the time but heard about it from the salesmen in the TV dept. A great bunch of guys. All the while it was on they kept saying "hey this is what Bernice does" but none of them came down to tell me to take a break and watch it. Your description was very informative and jibes with what they told me, but they were more impressed by the stunts than they were with the rest of it.



desgnated number of loops,


land, come back to your take

most touch and goes in a given spot is the winner. TEAM COMBAT. From the sounds of




AT THE FIELD

Stunt type - no modification- may be balanced on one blade only.

#### ENGINE

K & B Series front intake with perry carburator and muffler No modifications

The amount spent on club activity was offset by the meeting raffles so that the \$21 was the balance. The workers banquet, club only event prizes etc. were covered in this category.






